

Welcome to UCD Open Learning

Open Learning is an innovative, part-time and flexible programme, which allows students to study at a slower pace. If you are interested in just taking one module or just experiencing college life, please visit our website (www.ucd.ie/openlearning). This brochure is designed for students who are considering a Progression Pathway to one of 15 UCD degree programmes. There are no formal entry requirements to join a pathway, however, it is aimed at students who feel ready to engage in university life.

Open Learning provides all the benefits of being an undergraduate UCD student, without the full-time commitment. Students participate in classes with other UCD students and complete modules to earn credits towards a Certificate in Open Learning. Accruing credit involves completing the assessments required for your chosen modules, such as essays, presentations, or end-of-semester exams. Open Learning students have the same access to all UCD supports, services, clubs and societies.

To understand the requirements of each pathway, please read through this brochure. There is a list of over 400 UCD modules is available from our website, as well as further information on how to apply. We hope you find a pathway and modules that are of interest to you. If you'd like to meet a member of the team, reach out to us to make an appointment.

Open Learning offers 15 Progression routes for full-time undergraduate study

Open Learning is a **part-time flexible study** pathway which prepares you for an undergraduate degree. Students who commence a progression pathway in September 2024 and successfully meet the requirements of the programme, could join their degree programme in September 2025.

Open Learning students are fully registered students, with a UCD student card and access to the same facilities and supports as all other UCD students. They are expected to meaningfully take part in their classes and are subject to the UCD Student Charter.

Students on this programme study modules taken directly from UCD undergraduate degree programmes. You build your own timetable by choosing from more than 400 modules taken directly from UCD undergraduate degrees. You will participate in classes, labs, and tutorials with full-time students. The modules you pick will be informed by the degree pathway you are following.

Students who earn 30 credits (6 x 5 credit modules) receive a NFQ Level 7 Certificate in Open Learning. This can be used to apply through the CAO for dedicated places on 15 different UCD degree programmes depending on Grade Point Average (GPA) and modules completed.

Top Tips

- Seek advice on module selection.
- Take first year (stage one) modules.
- Make sure you are meeting programme requirements.



Who is Open Learning for?

An Open Learning Progression Pathway might be something to consider if you:

- Have had your educational journey been interrupted or ended prematurely.
- Don't yet qualify for entry to an undergraduate degree.
- Want to get a feel for university life before starting a full-time degree.
- · Are trying to decide between different subjects.
- · Are returning to education and want to brush up on your study skills.
- · Want to build a firm study foundation before committing to a degree.
- Need to build confidence before embarking on your degree programme.

How do the Progression Pathways work?

The Open Learning Progression Pathways are an access route exclusive to UCD. Applications to join Open Learning are made directly to UCD Access and Lifelong Learning through the UCD Online Application System. A reserved number of places are available on 15 degree programmes for students who successfully complete a Certificate in Open Learning and who meet the entry requirements of their programme.

In order to fulfill the requirements of each pathway, please read through this brochure. Students wishing to progress to a degree, must complete 30 credits (pass 6 modules) and achieve the required GPA for their programme. Students undertaking a pathway in 2024, will apply for entry to their chosen degree programme via the CAO (if an EU student) and via UCD Global (if a non–EU student) with a view to commencing in September 2025.

Students on these pathways will receive Recognition of Prior Learning for relevant modules in the first year of their undergraduate programme. While students cannot accelerate into stage 2 (second year), they will often find they have a reduced workload.

How do I get started?

Applications to join an Open Learning Progression Pathway are made directly to UCD, via the Online Application System. Applications for 2024/25 will open on **23rd August 2024**.

There are no formal entry requirements and no documentation is required, however, students must demonstrate their willingness to study. Students **do not** select their modules until they are fully registered on the programme. They do not select modules at application stage.

- Every applicant for a Progression Pathway must attend a consultation meeting with a member of the ALL Team.
 At this meeting, we will discuss the pathway options, module selection and also go through our Readiness Checker.
- Progression Pathways meetings will commence from 26 August 2024.
- Students who receive an offer, will have a limited window to accept their place.
- If your offer lapses, it will be offered to another student.
- Students who accept their offer will receive an invite to the ALL Welcome in early September.
- Fee deadlines must be met as outlined on the UCD Fees
 Office website
- Progression Pathways students are required to attend check-in meetings twice a year with the Access and Lifelong Learning Team.

Progression Pathways Consultation

Once you have submitted your application form, you will be sent an email inviting you to book in for a consultation with one of our team. This is an informal discussion to check that Open Learning is the right fit for you and to firm up your module choices and objectives for the academic year. It is also the perfect opportunity for you to ask any questions you may have about the programme.

Students who wish to join a Progression Pathway must attend a Progression meeting. In order to make the most of your Progression meeting, we would ask you to please spend some time on the following tasks:

- Complete our Open Learning Readiness checker before the meeting – this is a quick self-assessment tool to give you an idea of areas you may wish to do a bit more preparation before commencing Open Learning.
- Review the required/recommended modules for your intended pathway – each pathway has its own module requirements. These are subjects that you must cover in order to be eligible to progress into a degree. It is important that you select the right modules for the degree you hope to study.
- Read the module descriptors everything you need to know about a module from when it's on, to what the assessment method will be, can be found in the module descriptor.

It's a good idea to spend a bit of time looking through the descriptors before deciding which modules you want to study.

Next Steps: What happens after I accept my offer?

Once you attend your consultation session and receive your offer, you will only have a limited time period to accept your place.

- You will receive your offer via your Online Application Account and should check it regularly for updates.
- You must accept your offer so that UCD can create your student profile – this allows you to complete your online module selection once registration opens.
- Open Learning students will be notified by UCD Registry as to when they can start module selection. You must monitor your email during this time.
- Modules are filled on a first come first served basis and students are not guaranteed a place on their chosen module(s).
- Fee deadlines must be met as outlined on the UCD Fees Office website

Fees and Funding

Course fee

5 credit module: €500 **7.5 credit module:** €750 **6 x 5 credit modules:** €3,000


To complete a Certificate in Open Learning, students complete 6 modules - €3,000.

We offer a limited number of 7.5 credit modules. Students are responsible for ensuring they are aware of their credit load and the weighting of each module they select.

While students can audit modules (take no assessment), students on a Progression Pathway must study for credit and complete 30 credits to obtain a Certificate in Open Learning as part of their admission criteria.

There are financial support opportunities available for Open Learning students including the Sanctuary Programme for Refugees and Asylum seekers and Student Assistance Funds for Part-Time Learners and Students who are Parenting.

Help with your registration and module selection

You will discuss module selection at your Progression Pathways consultation. However, if you need additional assistance, please get in touch with the Access and Lifelong Learning Team. Jenny offers regular drop-in hours for students or you can make an appointment.

You can also view the registration video guides on the UCD website. It is really important to make the right decision when it comes to selecting your module. If you are selecting a module for interest or because you wish to progress to a degree programme, you should consider the following:

- What subject areas am I interested in?
- Have I read the module description?
- What is the time commitment involved?
- Is the level suitable for me?
- If considering taking the assessment, what's involved?
- Are there any mandatory modules to be eligible for the Progression Pathway of my choice?
- Have I considered taking a Study Skills module?



BSc City Planning & Environmental Policy

If you are interested in both the built and natural environment, and how human actions affect the environment, a degree in City Planning & Environmental Policy offers you a unique opportunity to further your interests. The degree integrates subjects that will deepen and broaden your understanding of environmental, social and economic issues, and sets these in a practical policy context. A degree in City Planning & Environmental Policy provides you with strong analytical skills, as well as the ability to think critically about development and environmental issues. This degree provides the first steps to pursuing a career as a professional planner, urban designer or environmental policy expert.

Programme Requirements:

Eligible students must complete 6 modules and achieve a GPA of at least 2.6 in the Open Learning Certificate. Eligible students must complete required modules (20 credits) and two other first year modules.

• ENVP10010 Environment Change & Policy

Our programmes aim to provide students with the knowledge and understanding of key scientific facts, principles, concepts and theories relevant to Agriculture and particularly animal and crop production, food production, forestry, horticulture and related environments and industries. Students are encouraged to think critically, be active, motivated, autonomous learners and to aspire to lifelong learning, leadership and individual career growth and development.

Programme Requirements:

Eligible applicants must complete 6 modules and achieve a GPA of at least 3.08 in the Open Learning Certificate. 2 modules out of 6 must be from Science programmes. O6/H7 in Leaving Certificate Mathematics or an equivalent Open Learning Mathematics module.

BSc Food Science

Food Science develops your scientific knowledge of how to produce high-quality, safe and nutritious food for the global market. As a food scientist, you'll have a role to play in all aspects of the food chain, from production at farm level to the retailer and to the consumer.

Programme Requirements:

Eligible applicants must complete 6 modules and achieve a GPA of at least 3.08 in the Open Learning Certificate. 2 modules out of 6 must be from Science programmes. O6/H7 in Leaving Certificate Mathematics or an equivalent Open Learning Mathematics module.

Eligible applicants must complete 6 modules and achieve a GPA of at least 3.08 in the Open Learning Certificate. 2 modules out of 6 must be from Science programmes. O6/H7 in Leaving Certificate Mathematics or an equivalent Open Learning Mathematics module.



Eligible students must complete 6 modules and achieve a GPA of at least 2.6 in the Open Learning Certificate. There are no specific module requirements for this programme. Our module list is divided by College – School – Academic level to make it as easy as possible for you to find the right modules for your Certificate.

Recommended Modules:

Students are strongly encouraged to take Stage 1 (first year) modules. Explore your subject options – Arts is one of UCD's broadest degree programmes and offers a variety of subject combinations. Open Learning is your chance to experience these subjects at university level and to make an informed choice about your degree.

GPA Requirement: 2.6 or higher. **Number of Places for 2025/26:** 5

Our module list is divided by College – School – Academic level to make it as easy as possible for you to find the right modules for your Certificate.

Recommended Modules:

Explore your subject options – Humanities is one of UCD's newest degree programmes and offers a variety of subject combinations. Open Learning is your chance to experience these subjects at university level and to make an informed choice about your degree.

Part of UCD College of Business, one of six academic Colleges that together form University College Dublin, it combines the excitement of university life with one of the most progressive education programmes in the world.

BSc Science

If you have a fascination with natural phenomena and find yourself constantly asking "why?" and "how?", then you're well on your way to being a scientist. With an exciting and diverse range of subjects, Science at UCD unfolds a universe of career opportunities for students who have an enquiring mind, an ability to solve problems and a desire to explore new worlds. The first year of the Common Entry DN200 Science course is designed to enable you to sample a number of subjects in your chosen area. The UCD Science DN200 course offers 26 subjects categorised into seven streams.

Eligible applicants must complete 6 modules and achieve a GPA of at least 3.08 in the Open Learning Certificate. Students must pass one maths module and two science modules, alongside their three other modules



Criminology with Psychology

Criminology is the systematic study of crime and its control.

Criminologists ask what causes crime and how we might best respond to it, and why certain behaviours are criminalised while others are not. This new undergraduate programme brings together expertise in the Sutherland School of Law and the School of Psychology to offer an inspiring interdisciplinary learning experience. Students will develop versatile analytical skills and the ability to compare and contrast different perspectives as they consider crime, punishment, law, psychology and social policy in new and exciting contexts. The programme equips graduates with the tools to be active citizens, professional problem solvers and seekers of social justice.

Programme Requirements:

Eligible students must complete 6 modules and achieve a GPA of at least 2.6 in the Open Learning Certificate. Students must complete 3 criminology modules (15 credits) and 1 psychology module (5 credits).
